While the administration maintains that a downsized faculty and staff won't impact education and student experience, academic programs face a starvation diet: Next Fall the Environmental Program will have fewer than five full-time-equivalent faculty on hand to teach and advise nearly 400 majors; the English department will lose three professor positions devoted to creative writing-fiction, Irish and British modern lit, and Victorian lit—plus its introductory writing offerings will be reduced by half. Campus-wide available seats for students are shifting from small classes to large: Next year a third of places for students will be in classes with more than 60 students—17% in “supersize me” classes of 150 to 300!
